Neighborhood Safety Initiatives (NSI)

An implementation partner with the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety, together we collaborate with NeighborhoodStat (NSTAT) resident teams at 15 NYCHA sites to support residents on **improving the safety and well-being of their neighborhoods** by:

- Investing in their communities
- Transforming public spaces and
- Influencing systemic policy change.

NSI works side-by-side with NStat resident teams to implement our community-centered problem-solving process that is grounded in the belief that public safety and well-being cannot exist without the input and feedback from the communities that it effects.



We currently work in 17
developments in across NYC,
lead by dedicated community
organizers.

In 15 of those developments,
NSI leads teams consisting of
365 NYCHA residents
consisting of the following:

- **35% are seniors (55+)**
- **11% youth (under 21)**
- **54% adults (22-54)**

Driving Policy Change

We work to bridge the goal between policymakers and community members on the ground.

In partnership with MOCJ, NSI designs and executes Central NStat, a process where NStat teams **identify policy issues** **discuss it with City representatives, City agency staff, and other policy-relevant stakeholders.**



Driving Policy Change

We implemented a new **collective and participatory decision-making process to bring even more residents to the table at a much larger scale.**

Engagement Coordinators and local Nstat Teams launched this process via interactive, idea-generating, and community visioning events at each of the 15 MAP sites. NYCHA Residents weighed in on community safety priorities and submitted ideas for up to \$30,000 in funding.

INFLUENCING POLICY

In January 2021, over 300 NYCHA residents and partners came together for a virtual launch event to learn how resident priorities can influence policy.

From February to May, almost 200 residents and partners met every 3 weeks in working groups around health and well-being, safety and justice, economic stability, physical space, and youth development to create a shared action agenda for public safety and well-being at ONS neighborhoods. We came up with 48 strategies. Our NStat teams selected 5 projects that best resonate with Castle Hill priorities. Use this ballot to choose one of these projects to decide how \$30K should be spent!



PHYSICAL SPACE

- Reduce door breakage and improve the door repair process
- Develop rapid responses to unsafe conditions like construction and low lighting
- Clean common spaces led by active residents with better NYCHA infrastructure & service
- Create quality open and recreation facilities and programming for all residents

ECONOMIC STABILITY

- Increase residents' access, awareness and participation in education + employment opportunities, trainings and programs
- Connect education + job training to long-term/stable careers
- Connect residents launching their own businesses to resources to help them be successful

HEALTH + WELL-BEING

- Take proactive measures to destigmatize mental health
- Increase access to and training around culturally competent "mental wellness" information and services
- Increase equitable access to supportive services, preparedness, testing and vaccination
- Increase access to fresh, nutritious, and affordable food for residents
- Support the creation, sustainability and access of local food distribution systems/networks to ensure day-to-day availability and during emergency relief

C1. PHYSICAL SPACE | Love Where You Live Campaign*
If selected, this project will seek to improve environmental conditions of common spaces through stewardship led by building and floor reps, community clean-up & planting days, training, signage, and supplies, advocacy through neighbor-to-neighbor meetings, and projects that highlight unique community features and promote pride.



C2. ECONOMIC STABILITY | Education & Job Training Programs
This project aims to connect education and job training to long-term, stable careers through on-site college fairs, youth mentorship, career coaching, subsidized apprenticeship programs, and events offering funding opportunities for education & entrepreneurial start-ups.



C3. HEALTH + WELL-BEING | Holistic Health Services
This project seeks to increase access to culturally competent wellness and healing through opportunities like resource guides, training for community ambassadors, mental health first aid training that centers racial equity and coping skills, and small group "safe place" meetings to promote trust, sharing, and healing.



C4. SAFETY + JUSTICE | Re-Entry Support
This project seeks to increase the support for NYCHA residents and families impacted by incarceration and the criminal justice system. Potential programs may include: a family support network, resource guide, training for credible messengers and front-line staff to recognize signs of trauma and how to offer help, and creative strategies like healing circles, arts workshops, and storytelling.



C5. YOUTH DEVELOPMENT | Youth Designed Projects
This project will co-create programming by youth for youth. Possibilities may include: arts & entrepreneurship programs; mentorships that address trauma, healing circles, or peer-to-peer support groups; life skills training from financial management to healthy relationships; and expanded networks to help youth access a wider range of opportunities.




Event Attendance


Goal of 5% of the Population **(2,489)**

Voting Goal of 15% of the Population **(7,467)**






Community Engagement






Youth Leadership Council (YLC)





Youth Leadership Council (YLC)

Number Of Participants By Age




Participants By Location






Count of What type of event is this?



INFLUENCING POLICY

In January 2021, over 300 NYCHA residents and partners came together for a virtual launch event to learn how resident priorities can influence policy.

VD1. PHYSICAL SPACE | Improve Unsafe Conditions

This project focuses on making rapid improvements to unsafe conditions. The team will focus on co-designing quick improvements to construction areas; doing safety walkthroughs; leading campaigns to address chronic repair backlogs and to influence policy; holding awareness campaigns for issues such as gas outages, and more.



VD2. ECONOMIC STABILITY | Education & Job Training Programs

This project aims to connect education and job training to long-term, stable careers through on-site college fairs, youth mentorship, career coaching, subsidized apprenticeship programs, and events offering funding opportunities for education & entrepreneurial start-ups.



VD3. HEALTH + WELL-BEING | Holistic Health Training

This project seeks to train and support local resident leaders and community based organizations in providing culturally competent wellness & healing services. It also includes expanding mental health first aid training that centers racial equity and coping skills, access to resource guides, and small group "safe place" meetings to promote trust, sharing, and healing.



VD4. SAFETY + JUSTICE | Reduce Gun Violence

This project aims to increase community-based support to prevent and respond to gun violence by supporting mini-grants focused on community-led strategies; offering trainings on peacemaking practices and restorative justice; hosting intergenerational healing events and providing access to therapeutic services.



VD5. YOUTH DEVELOPMENT | Youth Designed Projects

This project will co-create programming by youth for youth. Possibilities may include: arts & entrepreneurship programs; mentorships that address trauma, healing circles, peer-to-peer support groups; life skills training from financial management to healthy relationships; and expanded networks to help youth access a wider range of opportunities.



- Increase the use of data-driven and research-based strategies to reduce crime and increase safety, and
- Build the capacity of the community and cross-sector partners to achieve sustainable safety improvements.
